2011 Census Snapshot: Schoolchildren and full-time students at their non term-time address by sex by age

October 2013

Introduction

The 30th of August 2013 saw census release 3.3 from the Office of National Statistics which included Detailed Characteristics data for demography and families. This snapshot sets out the key findings for London from table DC1106EW which provides 2011 Census estimates for schoolchildren and full-time students (aged 4 and over) at their non term-time address in England & Wales by sex and by age.

For the purposes of census data collection and publication individuals in full-time education are considered to be 'usually resident' at their term-time address. In many instances, particularly among school-age children, an individual's term-time address and their non-term time address will be the same. However in some cases the two addresses will be different, particularly among university students and boarding school pupils. In England & Wales, in 2011, there were 685,206 school children and full-time students with a non-term time address that was different from their term time address. The age structure of this population is analysed here for London both regionally and at borough level. The estimates are as at Census Day, 27th March 2011.

In this document school children and full-time students will be referred to as students while NTTA will represent non term-time address.

Key Findings

- 17.6 per cent of NTTA students in London were aged between 4 and 15. This was the highest percentage of any region within England & Wales
- The largest percentage shares of NTTA students both in London and England & Wales were in the age cohort 18 to 21
- 59.2 per cent of NTTA students in London were aged 18 to 21. Of these, almost three quarters (72.6 per cent) resided in the Outer Boroughs, compared to 27.4 per cent in the Inner Boroughs
- Just under a quarter (22.6 per cent) of mature NTTA students in England & Wales over the age of 25 were in London.

Schoolchildren and full-time students at their non term-time address by region

In England & Wales, 14.6 per cent of NTTA students resided in London, second only to the South East region which accounted for 19.1 per cent (see Table 1). Within London, 59.2 per cent of NTTA students were aged 18 to 21. In all other regions this age group accounted for a larger proportion of the NTTA population (see Table 2).

17.6 per cent of NTTA students in London were aged between 4 and 15. This was the highest percentage of any region within England & Wales (see Table 1) and suggests that school children from families in London are more likely to attend school away from their family home than those in other regions. Overall, 22.1 per cent of NTTA students in England & Wales, between the ages of 4 and 18, were in London.

In England & Wales, just under a quarter (22.6 per cent) of NTTA mature students over the age of 25 were in London. London was the region with the highest proportion of NTTA students over the age of 25 (see Table 1).

There was an even split between male and female students with an NTTA in London (50.7 per cent male, 49.3 per cent female). This can also be said for England & Wales (50.2 per cent male, 49.8 per cent female). Female NTTA students in London were more likely to be aged 18 to 21 than their male counterparts. In the other age cohorts, the opposite is true (see Table 3).

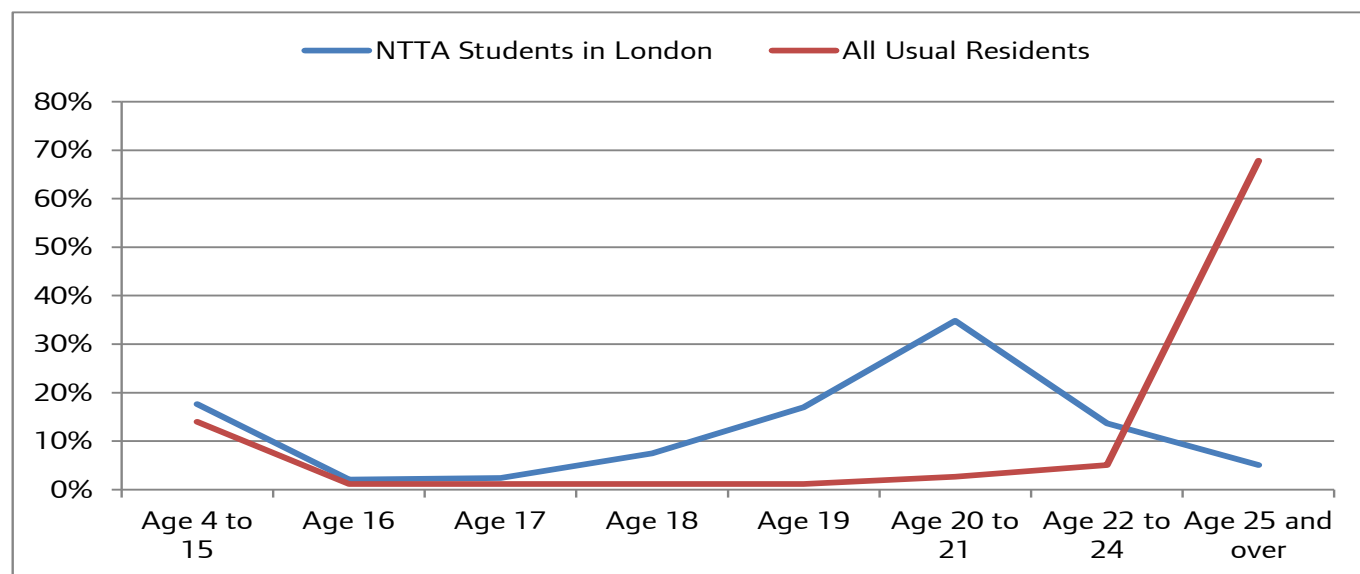

NTTA Students compared to all usual residents

Figure 1 outlines the age structures of the usual resident population and the NTTA student population. Data for each age group is displayed as a proportion of the total population in each group.

There were much higher percentage shares of NTTA students compared to all usual residents in London in all age categories, other than age 25 and over. There was a large difference between the two population sets between the ages of 18 and 21, due to those attending university. Overall, 59.2 per cent of NTTA students in London were aged 18 to 21 compared to 5.0 per cent of all usual residents.

As expected, those aged 25 and over had a much larger percentage share of all usual residents in London in comparison with NTTA students in London. In this age category there was a difference of 62.7 percentage points. Age 20 to 21 was the next age category with the largest difference. In London, 2.7 per cent of all usual residents were aged 20 to 21, whereas 34.8 per cent of NTTA students were in the same age group (a difference of 34.8 percentage points, see Figure 1).

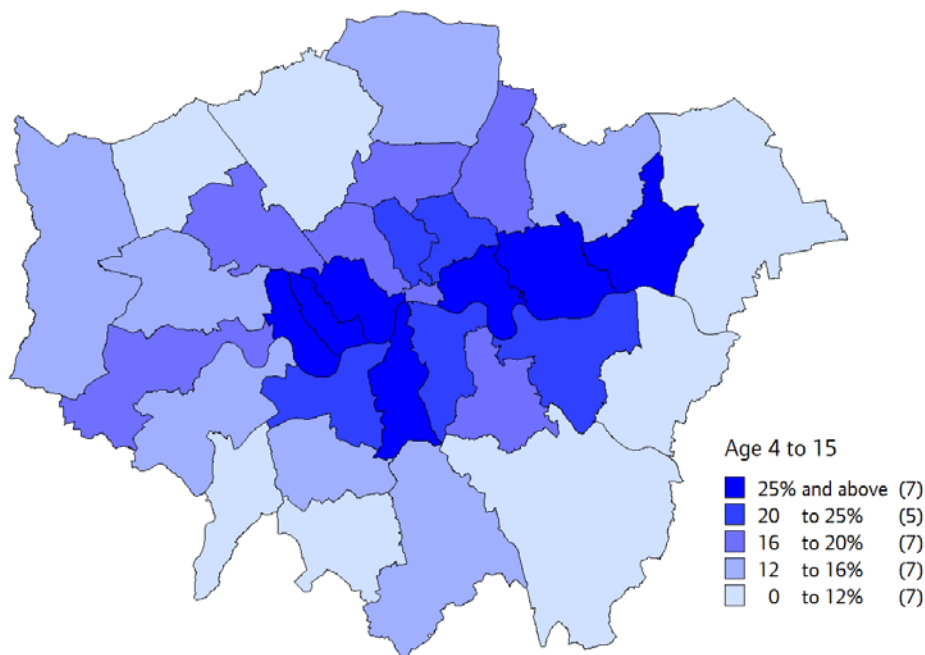
NTTA Students by Age

Age 4 to 15

17.8 per cent of NTTA students in London were aged 4 to 15, compared to 14.4 per cent in England & Wales (see Table 2). 18.9 per cent of male NTTA students in London were aged 4 to 15 while 16.3 per cent of females were in this age group (2.6 percentage points less).

NTTA students aged 4 to 15 in Tower Hamlets account for 34.1 per cent, this was the borough with the highest proportion of this age group. This was followed by Kensington & Chelsea and Hammersmith & Fulham with 39.4 per cent and 27.5 per cent respectively. Only one London borough had below 10 per cent; Sutton with 9.4 per cent (see Table 4 and Map 1).

Map 1: NTTA Students aged 4 to 15 percentage share in Local Authorities



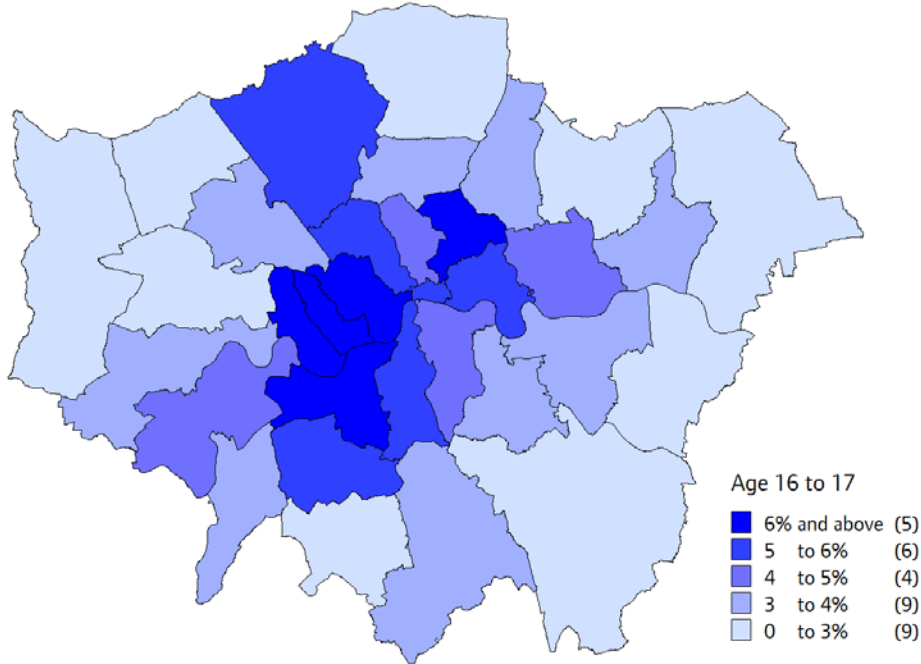

Age 16 to 17

Age 16 to 17 NTTA students constituted at least 8 per cent of the total NTTA population in five London boroughs. These were: Kensington & Chelsea (12.1 per cent), Hammersmith & Fulham (9.5 per cent), Wandsworth (9.3 per cent), Westminster (9.1 per cent) and Hackney (8.2 per cent).

16 to 17 year olds accounted for less than 2 per cent of NTTA students in two London boroughs: Redbridge with 1.9 per cent and Sutton, which had the lowest proportion, with 1.6 per cent (see Table 4 and Map 2).

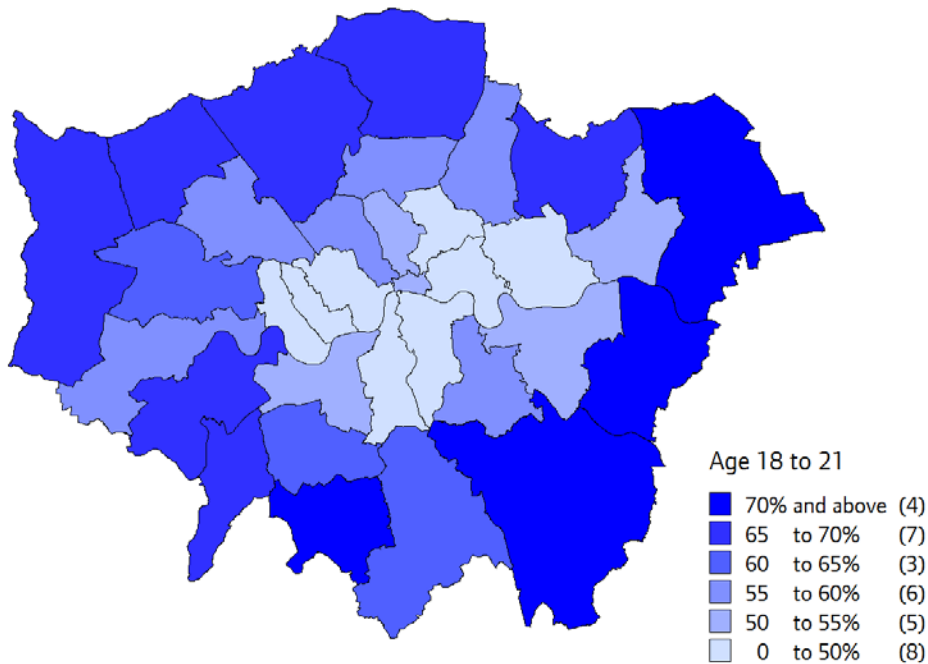
Age 18 to 21

The largest percentage shares of NTTA students both in London and England & Wales were in the age cohort 18 to 21. In England & Wales, 13.3 per cent of NTTA students aged 18 to 21 were in London (see Table 1). 59.2 per cent of NTTA students in London itself were aged 18 to 21. Of these, almost three quarters (72.6 per cent) resided in the Outer Boroughs, compared to 27.4 per cent in the Inner Boroughs.

Those aged 18 to 21 in Sutton accounted for 72.2 per cent of all NTTA students, this was the borough with the highest proportion of this age group. This was followed by Havering (72.1 per cent), Bromley (72.0 per cent) and Bexley (70.4 per cent). Only one London borough had a population in this age group which accounted for below 40 per cent of the NTTA population. This was Tower Hamlets with 36.0 per cent (see Table 4 and Map 6).

62.1 per cent of female NTTA students in London were aged 18 to 21 while 56.4 per cent of males were in this age category. NTTA students aged 20 to 21 had the largest difference between males and females in London, although this difference is still far from significant: there was a 2.8 percentage point difference, 36.2 per cent of female NTTA students were in this age group compared to 33.4 per cent of males.

Map 3: NTTA Students aged 18 to 21 percentage share in Local Authorities



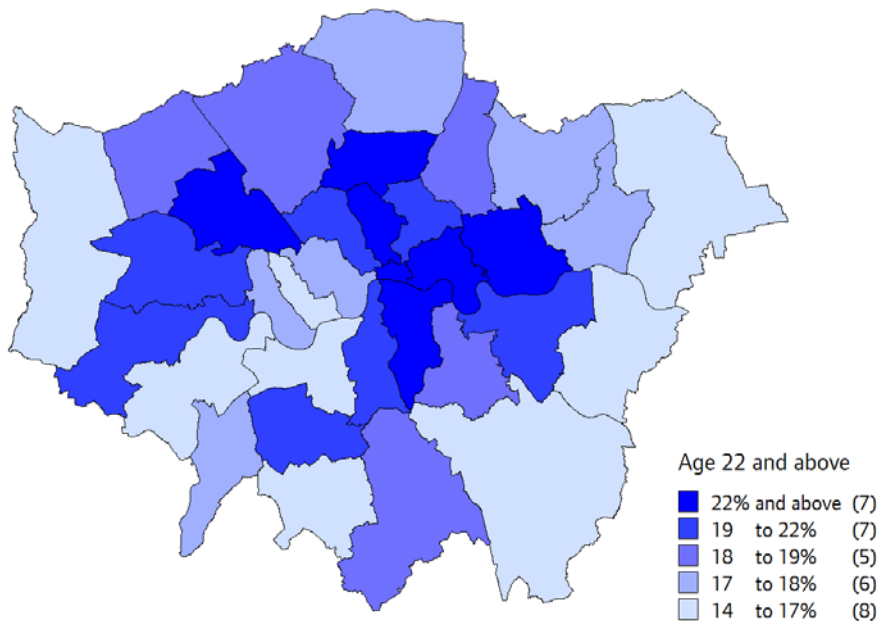

Age 22 above

Just under a quarter (22.6 per cent) of NTTA students aged 22 and over in England & Wales resided in London. This was 7.6 percentage points more than any other region. The South East was second with 15.0 per cent.

NTTA students aged 22 and above in Newham accounted for 27.5 per cent of all NTTA students, while 26.9 per cent were over 21 in the City of London, the only two boroughs to have over 25 per cent. For those boroughs with less than 20 per cent, the range was just 5.4 percentage points. Hackney had the largest share in this range with 19.9 per cent, and Havering had the lowest share at 14.5 per cent (see Map 4 and Table 4).
